



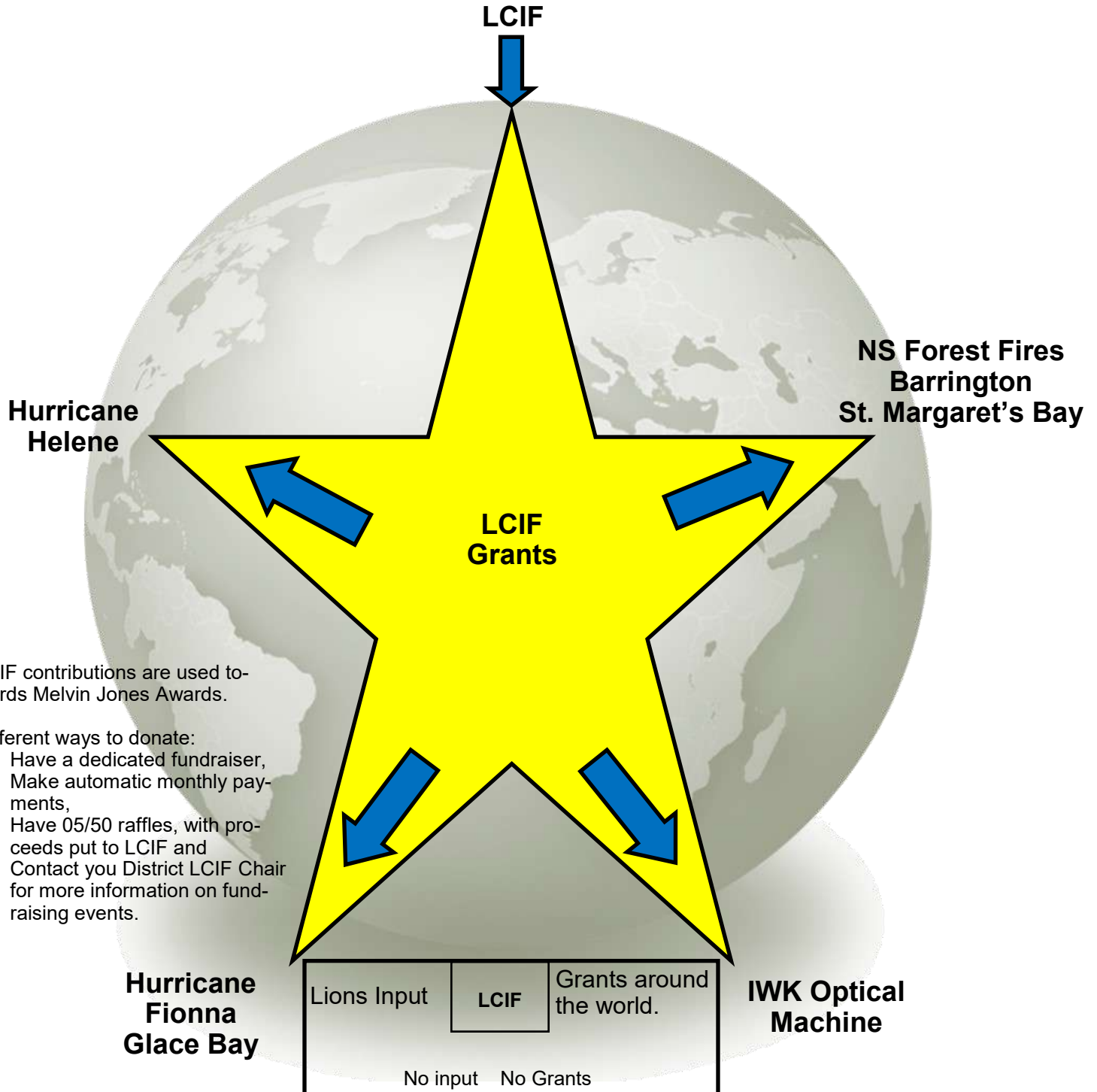

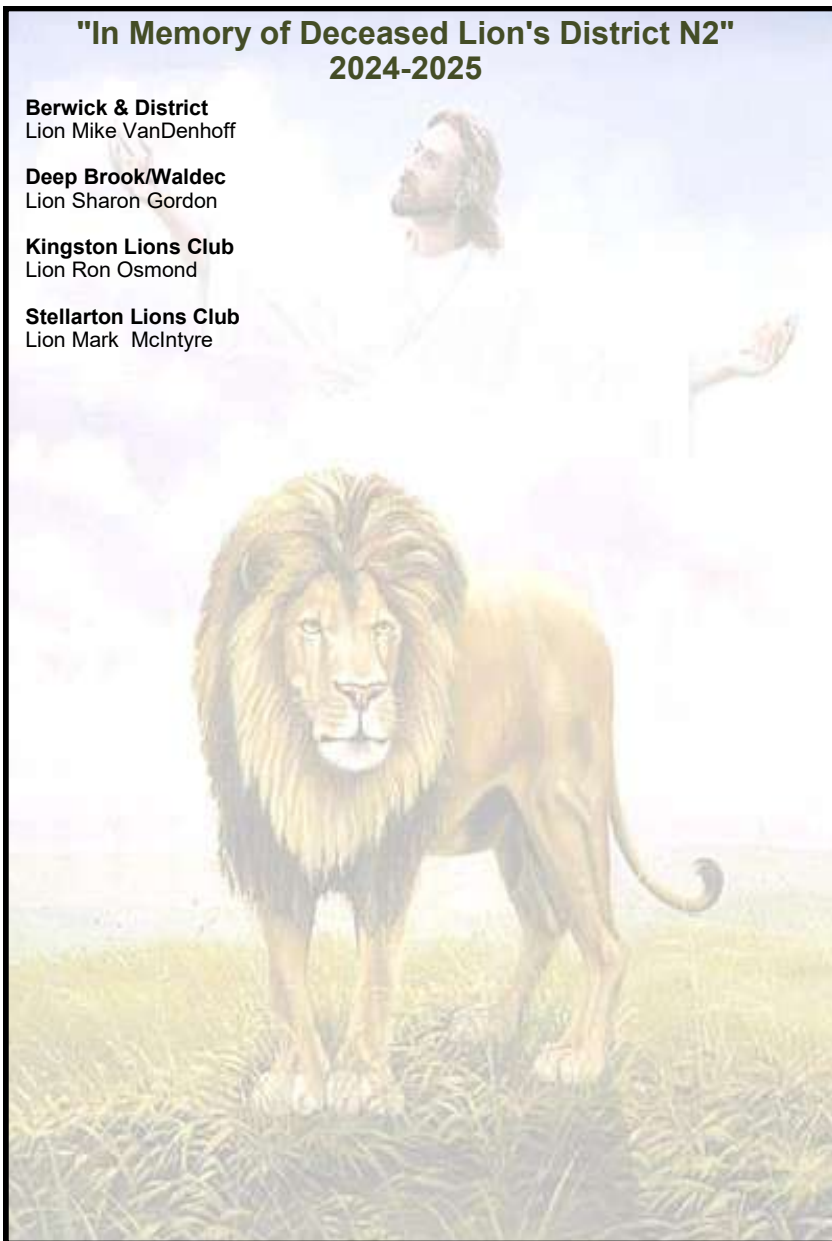

Fellow Lions of District N2:

Welcome back to another great year of serving as Lions and having fun. SVDG Pat Nixon, GMT Linda Baltzer and I just returned from the Mission 1.5 Summit in Toronto.

It was an eventful weekend, with a lot of information and ideas on how we can strengthen and build our districts. In the coming weeks and months, we hope to use this knowledge to encourage all clubs to build on their membership and to help retain members.

It is a pleasure to be working with District Global Membership Chair, Lion Linda again and Lion Pat as our first District Global Extension Chair this year. We are here to help you and ask that you reach out to us if you require assistance.

One goal of Lions International is for our Constitutional Area 2 (Canada) to continue growing our membership so we can better serve all our communities. More Lion members mean more service by our clubs to enrich the areas in which we live. An important factor is retaining our present membership and ensuring they are engaged in club activities.

So, what does this mean for our District specifically:

1. Net growth of +2 for District N2. This means whatever your club membership was on July 1, 2024, then you need to be up two more members by June 30, 2025. For example: if your club was at 20 members at the start of this fiscal year, then we challenge you to be at 22 in membership by the end of the year.
2. Please utilize social media (Facebook, Instagram, TikTok) and the Just Ask program (located on the LCI website or the link below). There are many suggestions for ways to help you increase your club membership.
3. Each club can also partner with other organizations and town officials to further our service projects and serve our communities.
4. Each club should appoint a Membership Chair to aid in the process of building your club. We would like you to forward the name of the person you select to your Zone Chair. This information will then be forwarded to Lion Linda. We will need this by Oct 16th, 2024, but the sooner the better. Once compiled, we will be having monthly Zoom meetings to share ideas and find solutions for clubs in need.
5. Our District Goal is to be up one (1) new club by the June 30th, 2025. If you have an idea that you think an area could benefit from having a Lions Club, please reach out to us.

These are exciting times in our District, and we are counting on every Lion to help us grow our service. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact either me, Pat or Linda directly.

Re-located Sherbrooke antique, classic car show hit with owners, visitors

SHERBROOKE — The first antique and classic car show held at its new home — the Lions Club property here — attracted more than 55 vehicle entries and more than 350 visitors Sept. 8.

"I couldn't ask for anything more for the community of St. Mary's and our inaugural event here," St. Mary's District Lions Club Past-President Dave Smith told The Journal.

He noted that there was a "great turnout" not only for the car show, but also a dance held at the hall on the previous night (Sept. 7).

"It's been fantastic, with a large number of cars — more than we expected, especially with the weather. Everybody had a great time," Smith added.

He explained that the new venue "decreased the amount of work that the Lions Club had to do in order to hold the event."

When judging began, winners were chosen from the 585 votes cast. Denny Cinton of Antigonish, with his eight-cylinder,

three-speed 1930 Dodge Brothers coupe, garnered first place.

A 1965 Ford Mustang convertible, a four-speed with a 289 engine, owned by Raymond and Beverly Webber from Tor Bay, took second spot, while Sam Jordan and his wife, Belina, from Indian Harbour Lake, collected third place with their 1927 Model-T Ford Roadster.

Smith offered special thanks to the volunteers, "who are very hard to come by and who are super special in all of the work that they do." He added, "They came out

and did a fantastic job. It was a huge success."

Co-organizer Jimmy Porter agreed. "It was an excellent turnout for the first time at our new venue," he told The Journal, while thanking everyone who welcomed the event to its new home.

Porter added, "Thank you to all of our workers, including our Lions members, those who stood up and cooked, as well as the motel (Sherbrooke Village Inn) for having a turkey dinner during the day. We are all going there after we wrap up here."

He also thanked those who directed traffic — "getting cars off the Highway and keeping spectators safe."

And, of course, those who entered their vehicles.

"Even though the weather was a little iffy, we pulled it off," Porter said.

When Lynx Mayne, who

organized the then Sherbrooke Show and Shine from 2007 to 2023, announced she was stepping down — in an effort to keep the annual event going — Porter approached the Lions, along with lion co-organizer —

on the club's property in Sherbrooke. "We said, 'Sure, we're on board, let's give it a go, give it a try, see what we can do with it,'" she told The Journal.

has been visiting the area with his wife, Helen, for 40 years, won the 50-50. "It was a very nice thing for Bill to do, and I know the Lions appreciate his generosity a lot," Porter said of Reinhart donating half of his prize (\$200) to the club.

Amy Simon, outreach co-ordinator and communications assistant for the Whale Sanctuary Project (WSP), and WSP volunteer Selinda Jordan, led a silent auction, with the proceeds going to the car show.

"I can't wait for it to come," Porter said of next year's show, "with a little better weather."

He added, "Once people hear about it from city or folk who were here, about how good it was, we should have another great event."

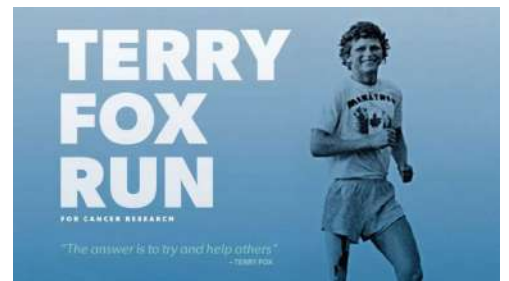

This grant is not to help buy food but to help Community Food Service groups to buy or create a serviceable space so they can help to service those with food insecurities. For example: buy fridges or freezers, upgrade or build kitchens, tables and chairs to feed people on, or even vehicles to help deliver food to the needy – the possibilities go on.

This is a matching grant, so your group only needs to raise half the amount required. What a great way to make our funds go further to help others.

Some groups could already have a project in mind, but this is not limited to just them, we can all look into this wonderful opportunity. Please look around your area and see how we make this happen. One example is supporting existing projects like School Programs that might need equipment to make it easier to serve people.
